



Borough's December Retreat to Focus on

The Aleutians East Borough is hosting a 3-day retreat in Anchorage on Dec. 7 - 9, 2009 for staff, elected officials and residents. The meeting will be held at the Courtyard by Marriott on Spenard Road. The first day will be a joint strategic planning session for the Aleutians East Borough and the Aleutians East Borough School Board. In the evening, AEB Resource Director Beth Stewart and Borough Fisheries Consultant Sam Cotten will host a fisheries issues discussion.

On Dec. 9th, the Borough will hold its strategic planning session. This will focus on three questions: Where Have We Been? Where Are We Now? Where Are We Going? The discussion may include capital projects and alternative energy.

Fish Meeting in Seattle Tackles P. Cod Sector Split and BOF AK Peninsula & Aleutian Islands Finfish Proposals

Nearly 30 people attended the fishermen's meeting in Seattle last week to discuss Alaska Board of Fisheries (BOF) proposals and the NPFMC's Pacific cod sector allocation motion. The Borough scheduled the meeting for 10:30 a.m. - Noon on Nov. 19, 2009 at the Silver Cloud Inn,

located across the street from the Qwest Field Center, where the Pacific Marine Expo was being held.

AEB Resource Director Beth Stewart began the meeting with an update on the allowable biological catch (ABC) for pollock set by the NPFMC's Plan Team for 2010 Season:

Plan Team's Recommendations for Pollock: 2010 Season	
A Season.....	5,879 tons
B Season.....	5,879 tons
C Season.....	7,984 tons
D Season.....	7,984 tons
Total.....	27,726 tons



The Plan Team's recommended ABC for the 2010 pollock season totals 27,726 tons for the A, B, C and D seasons.

The raw ABC numbers for the 2010 Pacific cod season recommended by the Plan Team are:

Plan Team's Recommendations for Pacific cod: 2010 Season	
Western Gulf.....	27,685 tons
Central Gulf.....	49,042 tons
Eastern Gulf.....	2,373 tons
Total.....	79,100 tons



The Plan Team's recommended ABC for the 2010 Pacific cod season totals 79,100 tons for the Western, Central and Eastern Gulf.

These numbers still need to be approved by the council. The 25% hasn't been subtracted yet for the state water fisheries, nor has the 10% for the offshore fishery.

Borough Fisheries Consultant Sam Cotten suggested having the advisory committees from King Cove and Sand Point choose a few issues which they can agree on. He said the fishermen's

testimony would be more powerful if they come to the BOF and the North Pacific Fishery Management Council (NPFMC) with common proposals. Beth recommended spending a day hammering out proposals, if fishermen are interested.

Borough Assemblywoman Justine Gundersen mentioned that two BOF proposals (#147 & # 148) would restrict openings in the northern district to allow more fishing in Nelson Lagoon. She said currently, fishermen from the village are concerned that the increased pressure in the area is having a negative affect on local streams.




BOF proposals # 147 & #148 would restrict openings in the northern district to allow more fishing in Nelson Lagoon.

Dick Jacobsen said there's no common ground among fishermen on proposed changes to the Kupreanof

line. (BOF proposal #141). He said if it's open, Area M fishermen will fish in the Chignik area. However, complications could arise. Beth reminded fishermen that the proposal suggests equal fishing time on different days. For example, providing an Area M fishing day and a Chignik day. Beth recommended getting charts for any proposals suggesting that a line should get moved.

An ongoing issue is how to address the lack of fishing time within the Southeastern District Mainland (SEDM). Because of low Chignik runs and the 600,000 fish guaranteed to Chignik fishermen, SEDM setnetters have been unable to fish in June and July for the past three years. BOF proposals #132 - 138 propose several changes that would allow SEDM setnet fishermen to obtain more time in their traditional fishing locations. ADF&G has offered to meet with local fishermen to discuss the proposals and help them figure out which changes would work best.

Beth said one proposal that seems to have widespread support among Area M fishermen is to limit the vessel size to 58 feet year round in state waters. She suggested that if fishermen still feel

this way, they should voice that concern to the Board of Fisheries in February.

Sam informed fishermen that the latest draft proposal of the NPFMC's Pacific cod sector allocation motion contains nearly the same analysis as a recent draft but it has new data and tables. Beth said the council is treating the western Gulf and Kodiak differently. She suggested that fishermen from the Borough agree on a percentage split between the pot and trawl gear types. Currently, catcher processors would get 25 percent. Sam said that's not favorable to Gulf communities.

Sam reminded fishermen that the Council is likely to make a final decision on the P. cod sector split motion in December. Those who have an interest in the issue are encouraged to testify next month.





AASB Holds its 56th Annual Conference in Anchorage

Sparkling Student Success was the theme of this year's Association for Alaska's School Boards (AASB) Annual Conference, held Nov. 5 - 8, 2009, in Anchorage. Keynote speakers Willie Hensley and Frank Kros, led a talented and dedicated group of education leaders, offering insights and information to school board members in attendance.



AEBSD Superintendent Dr. Phil Knight and Board President Tiffany Jackson presented a session to new school board members on board/superintendent roles and responsibilities at the AASB 56th Annual Conference in Anchorage.

Presentations included Assessment and Curriculum, Recruiting and Retaining Teachers, Advancing Civics Education for Alaska's Youth, Drop-out Prevention, The Teen Brain and Suicide, and Beyond Poverty.

Frank Kros, the keynote speaker, President of the Upside Down Organization and Executive Vice President of the Children's Guild, provided a presentation on how children of poverty have significantly different brains. Kros said distress in childhood (excess levels of the stress hormone cortisol) can harm the developing brain.

For example, he said the results can be low verbal skills, memory impairment, anxiety, dissociation and aggression. However, he pointed out that long-term studies have shown that educators can make a significant, lasting and positive impact on children of poverty. Kros said that means integrating curriculum and culture. In addition, he suggests providing an enriched environment which includes contrast, integration and connectivity, coherence, challenge, novelty and complexity.



Winter Driving:



In Ice and Snow, Take It Slow!

You've heard it before. But every winter, many of us seem to forget these important safety tips: Use slower acceleration and slower speeds. Avoid heavy steering and braking. Allow extra time to reach your destination during inclement weather. The bottom line is, it's not worth putting your own life or the lives of others in danger to save time.

- Drive with your headlights on. Keep your headlights clean!
- Be sure all occupants of the vehicle are secured in seat belts. It's the law.
- Remember that driving too fast or too slow can increase the likelihood of collisions.
- Look farther ahead in traffic. Actions by other drivers will alert you to problems and give you extra reaction time.
- Winter road conditions often result in longer stopping distances. Give yourself room. If you have anti-lock brakes, press the pedal down firmly and hold it. If you don't have anti-lock brakes, gently pump the pedal.
- Don't get overconfident with four-wheel drive. It won't help you stop any faster.
- Slow down when approaching intersections, off-ramps, bridges or shady spots. These all have the potential to develop black ice.
- Avoid abrupt actions while steering, braking or accelerating, to lessen your chance of losing control.
- Semi-trucks and buses take longer to stop. Don't cut in front of them.
- Avoid using cruise control or overdrive. Don't let your car make a bad decision for you.
- Follow the rules of the road. Don't contest the "right of way" or try to race another car during a merge. Be respectful of other motorists.
- Minimize distractions while driving. Be cautious, aware and responsible.

Job Description:

BSSN is a network of coastal villages in Alaska (Gambell, Togiak, and Sand Point) and Russia (Kanchalan, Tymlat, and Nikolskoye) that was formed in 2007 to gather local environmental and harvest observations. BSSN provides a structured network for systematic collection and data processing of these observations. The purpose of the project is to convert local observations into a format that can be used by the communities and scientists in addressing the impacts on important resources of the Bering Sea from current and emerging environmental changes, to human (industrial) activities in the region. The project is funded through August 2014.

The Community Research Assistant position is part time (approximately 22 hrs per week but could vary depending on actual work performed. Hours should not to exceed 30 hrs in one week.) The salary is DOE (Dependent on Experience).

Assistant's responsibilities:

1. Learn about BSSN: project goals, objectives, participants, and activities.
2. Communicate the project's goals and benefits to local communities at various community events.
3. Regularly communicate with BSSN office in Anchorage regarding all project matters by phone/fax/e-mail/Skype
4. Learn how to conduct interviews in accordance with the established methodology (training will be provided).
5. Schedule and conduct interviews following all provided instructions and in strict adherence to the methodology.
6. Administer technical compliance review of the conducted interviews.
7. Create electronic files in Word (text) and WMA (audio), scan completed surveys and send them to BSSN Office in Anchorage.
8. Mail paper copies of the interview forms and electronic files to the Anchorage office weekly.

9. Participate in monthly teleconferences
10. Collect/record other environmental observations, which may be necessary for successful implementation of project, as requested by BSSN researchers.
11. Perform any other tasks assigned by the project researchers.


