


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## Akutan Geothermal Project Receives Additional Funding, Drilling Permit

Since drilling two geothermal exploratory wells in 2010, the City of Akutan has continued to evaluate the potential for geothermal power development in the Hot Springs Bay Valley area of Akutan Island. Efforts have included geotechnical surveys, resource modeling, engineering analysis of an access road from Akutan Harbor, and selection of potential drilling

sites.

In January of 2015, the City's project team of RMA Consulting Group, Mead & Hunt Engineers, and Geothermal Resource Group, recommended the drilling of a 1,500 foot confirmation well in

Hot Springs Bay Valley, in order to more precisely locate and size the resource, for a potential 2 - 3 megawatt power plant. The drilling phase of the project will occur between June and August 2016, at an estimated cost of \$2,000,000. In addition to \$1.5 million being provided by Alaska Energy Authority (AEA), and the City of Akutan's matching funds, the City has received a \$931,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), which brings the total budget for the

project to \$2.45 million. This includes funding of approximately \$450,000 for post-drilling activities, such as a

drilling analysis, system designs and cost estimates, development of a business and operations plan, and well site monitoring and abandonment.

The Alaska Oil and Gas Conservation Commission recently issued a drilling permit to the City, authorizing next year's drilling program, and all but two State regulatory agency permits have been received to date. The City expects to submit the complete permit package to DOE and AEA within the next 45 - 60 days. This final review process will allow the City to begin the procurement and staging for a drill rig, helicopter assets, drilling materials and supplies, and a variety of technical and professional services. Final staging in Akutan is scheduled for on, or about, July 15, 2016.

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## **New Coast Guard Hangar on Horizon in Cold Bay**

Soon, the U.S. Coast Guard will have an expanded presence in Cold Bay during the fishing and crabbing seasons. The Coast Guard will soon break ground and lay the foundation for its second helicopter hangar. Renovation of the agency's first helicopter hangar, the former Evergreen

hangar, was completed about a year ago, and currently houses the Coast Guard's MH60 Jayhawk.

"This will provide another hangar, which would allow for two helicopters to be forward deployed at the same time," said Coast Guard Lt. Commander Dana Hiatt, the construction project manager.

During fishing and crabbing seasons (approximately October – May), maritime missions in the Bering Sea and the Aleutian Islands area are always a possibility, and the Coast Guard wants to be ready to respond.

"Since Cold Bay is a remote location, good support is critical," said Joseph McKenna, the design project manager and a registered architect. "We want to make sure we don't lose mission capability when a rescue call comes in."

Earlier this month, the Coast Guard held a pre-construction meeting.

"The basic design of the pre-engineered building

is done," said Hiatt. "Once the final design is completed, then crews will be allowed to proceed. The crews started preparing the site and put some materials down as they began getting ready for construction."

Crews will commence construction next month (in September). The hangar will be bigger than the first one, measuring 70' by 90', and will include additional space.

"This one will also have one heated office and a restroom with a shower, so that makes it nicer for the crews when they come back from a mission – to have a warm place to work," said Hiatt.

Construction in the Aleutians can be challenging, as people from the region well know.

"It's not so much the snow, but the wind," said McKenna. "High winds can be a safety concern. To mitigate possible accidents, we ensure the contractor has a good safety plan and workers are following the appropriate protocols."

McKenna said the community has been very accommodating, and that kind of cooperation has been invaluable.

“We’ve had really good support from the Cold Bay community,” he said. “We’ve gone out there two or three times during the design stage, just to talk with the locals and get information. They’ve been very, very helpful.”

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## **AHA Offers Unique Features in Two Housing Structures to Be Built in Sand Point**

### **Energy-Efficient Single-Family Home**

For the first time, the Aleutian Housing Authority (AHA) will launch construction of a single family home powered by a wind turbine. Sand Point will be the location for this unique energy-efficient home. AHA plans to set things in motion as soon as the organization nears the end of the design process, hopefully later this year.

“We’re designing it as a “passive house,” which originated as a German building standard,” said Steve Mandt, AHA Director of Construction and Project Management and an engineer. “The idea is to have a highly energy-efficient building. That includes a substantial amount of insulation and very air-tight construction to really drive down the heat energy consumption in the house.”

Mandt said the electricity generated by the wind turbine will be used in the house. Any

remaining electricity will be funneled back into the grid in Sand Point. While the price tag to build this one-of-a-kind home in Sand Point will be initially higher than other homes, after a while, the benefits will outweigh the costs.

“Obviously, the price is going to be higher to

build a more robust, super insulated and more airtight structure,” said Mandt. “However, over time, the project will definitely pay off because the home’s energy bills will be so low.”

AHA plans to offer this home as a rental property in Sand Point. However, there will be some requirements for the tenant to fulfill in order to make this project a success.

“Because of some of the unique systems, we would need to get a resident who’s willing to be a part of the whole project,” Mandt said. “The wind turbine has some maintenance requirements. So when there’s a high wind forecast, the tenant can actually lower the mast and set the turbine down on the ground, just for safety.”

AHA usually has staff in Sand Point that could typically take care of that. However, in the event that staff members are out of town, Mandt said it’s important to have a tenant that will be responsible for that requirement. In addition, once the turbine is up and running on the home, it will be important to monitor the systems and make sure everything is operating as it should.

“Definitely, we want to get someone who’s excited about living in a cutting-edge home and is going to take care of the systems – someone who will keep an eye on them and play along, so to speak,” Mandt said.

## **Duplex**

Sand Point will also see a new duplex popping up later this year, thanks to a THHP (Teacher Health Professional Housing Program) grant. AHA will specifically set aside this duplex for teachers, health professionals and public safety officials.

Mandt said AHA is approaching this three-bedroom duplex differently than those in the past.

“In the past, we’ve had one typical duplex design that we’ve used everywhere,” he said. “This one won’t follow the same pattern because we’re going to give it a single-family feel instead. The lot that we’re building on is actually a corner lot, so we have a unique opportunity to provide a separate entrance for each unit and provide a separate parking area for each unit.”

Between the duplex and the wind turbine-powered single-family home planned for Sand Point, AHA is excited to debut both construction projects in the months to come.

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## **Borough Resources Department Gearing Up for a Busy Fishery Management Season**

The Aleutians East Borough is sponsoring a preliminary teleconference meeting on September 1<sup>st</sup> at 10 a.m. for area fishermen to begin discussing the issues that will be addressed at the upcoming Board of Fish and North Pacific Fishery Management Council meetings this fall and winter.

The State Board of Fisheries addresses issues on a 3-year rotating cycle. Alaska Peninsula finfish proposals, including salmon & groundfish will be considered at meetings this year along with proposals for Chignik and the Aleutian Islands. Because the Alaska Peninsula finfish meeting is historically scheduled inconveniently during the State Pacific cod season in February and March, the Board decided to consider area P. cod issues this fall, on November 30 & December 1. Area salmon and other finfish proposals will still be considered at a meeting February 23 – March 1, 2016. Proposals for these meetings are now available online by clicking: [here](#). The Board extended the call for statewide pollock proposals until September 4. Those proposals will be considered at the Statewide Finfish meeting March 8 - 12. All of the Board of Fisheries meetings for the 2015/2016 cycle will be held in Anchorage, with the exception of the AYK finfish meeting in Fairbanks. 
The North Pacific Fishery Management Council will meet October 5 – 13 at the Anchorage Hilton to discuss several items of interest to our local fishermen. Several Observer program issues will be discussed: the pre-implementation plan for electronic monitoring, the 2016 Annual Deployment Plan and a discussion paper on full observer coverage for Gulf of Alaska trawl vessels. The Council will take up the topic of Gulf of Alaska Trawl



Bycatch Management (GOA TBM) again, after discussions were put on hold at the request of Alaska Department of Fish & Game Commissioner Sam Cotten. For more info: [www.npfmc.org](http://www.npfmc.org).

On Tuesday, September 8<sup>th</sup>, from 7 – 9 p.m., Mark Fina and Joshua Stoll will give a presentation and discuss bycatch management, fishing cooperatives, catch share plans and fishing communities. Then on Wednesday, September 9<sup>th</sup>, from 8:30 a.m. until noon is the 2<sup>nd</sup> Kodiak Community Forum to discuss GOA TBM. The two meetings are organized by the Kodiak Fisheries Work Group.

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## **20-Year Law Enforcement Officer Makes Sand Point his New Home**

What started as a far off dream became a reality after police officer Michael Chiesa and his wife decided they wanted to make Sand Point their home. Last spring, he joined the force, and since then, he has fallen in love with the community.

“For most of my law enforcement career, I was on a remote section of coast,” said Chiesa. “I’m used to being in small towns and close-knit communities. Sand Point just fits the bill. I love hiking and outdoor activities. There’s so much to do here,” he said.

Chiesa grew up in Half Moon Bay, south of San Francisco. He joined the police force there in 1991. Four years later, his law enforcement career took him to Sonoma County, where he worked for about 16 years. He later met Elizabeth,

another law enforcement officer. During a trip to Juneau, he proposed to her. Elizabeth, who hails from Juneau, never gave up her deep love for Alaska. Her husband quickly learned why this state has always meant so much to her. During later discussions, they learned both were harboring the same dream.

“We both actually shared a dream of coming back to Alaska to live,” he said.

Although they were happy with their jobs in California, Alaska continued to beckon them. In 2011, their dream came to fruition.

“We started looking for jobs,” he said. As it happened, the Kodiak Police Department was hiring and they were interested in both of us,” he added.

He started there as a police officer. She took a position as a corrections officer for the jail. Chiesa was later promoted to sergeant. Two years later, a friend of Chiesa’s gave high marks to Sand Point. Chiesa soon discovered that Sand Point’s Police Department was hiring.



“It looked like it would match the type of community I like living in,” he said.

After he applied and was hired, he was soon welcomed with open arms by the residents of Sand Point.

“The community has been very supportive of me as a new officer to Sand Point, and I definitely appreciate that,” said Chiesa.

Chiesa said he hit the ground running when he joined the force. He’s finding that one of the greatest challenges in this job is battling the drug problem in Sand Point.

“Sand Point has the same problems they have elsewhere, but there are fewer resources to deal with it here,” he said.

Nevertheless, Chiesa is up to the challenge, and he’s reassured to know that Sand Point does not experience random violence like some bigger cities do.

“There are no drive-by shootings,” he said. “You can let your kids play in the streets on their bikes. People are safe, and that’s a very positive thing.”

Meanwhile, Chiesa’s wife, Elizabeth, is hoping to make a positive mark on the community inside the classroom as she takes on a substitute teaching assignment at the Sand Point School. Outside

of the school's doors, her husband, Michael, strives to make sure Sand Point's residents, both young and old, are protected and out of harm's way.

"I'm looking forward to continuing my work with my fellow officers here in the community so Sand Point will remain a safe place to be for the people who live and work here," said Chiesa. "I'm very happy to be here, and we're definitely making Sand Point our home."

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## Districtwide Cross-Country Race in King Cove to Determine Winners for Regionals

About 43 kids from throughout the Aleutians East Borough School District are about to kick into high gear as the districtwide cross-country race takes place on Sept. 12<sup>th</sup> in King Cove.

"We have a lot of kids coming," said Amy Mack, District Activities Director. "About 20 from Sand Point will be here, another 21 from King Cove and two from False Pass."

That number includes some junior high basketball athletes who will hold practices and games at the same time.

"They come over at this time because it's convenient with the ferry," Mack added. "The junior high kids don't really have their own season like the high schoolers do. So this is an opportunity for them to get in a game as well as practices."

Meanwhile, the kids taking part in the districtwide cross-country race know there's a lot at stake.

"The district race will determine who goes to regionals," Mack said.

The top three girls and top three boys will compete in the regional competition in Dutch Harbor on Sept. 26<sup>th</sup>.

With that in mind, runners have to keep their sights trained on doing well in the districtwide race first, which consists of 3.5 miles. The course begins at the school and winds through the new Rams Subdivision. They'll run the loop two times and then wrap up back at the school. Getting ready for the big event means getting plenty of training.





“Here in King Cove, we have been alternating long runs, sprint exercises, hills and core workouts,” said Etta Kuzakin, King Cove cross-country coach. “I am extremely proud of the effort that the kids have been giving.”

“Training is centered around work days and recovery days,” said Sand Point cross-country coach Austin Roof. “Students either run at an increased tempo pace, a hill circuit, sprints or endurance. It’s all about reaching a peak level of exertion and then maintaining that level for longer and longer periods. The kids are working really hard, and Sand Point should have a good showing at this year’s race.”

While False Pass has fewer kids participating, the training has been every bit as rigorous.

“Along with conditioning exercises, we have been training every day on our ‘measured course’, focusing especially on hill climbing and break-away sprinting,” said False Pass cross-country coach Kevin Barnett. “We have also been running on mossy terrain to build strength and endurance. Our course times have steadily improved, and we are optimistic we can make a good showing at the district meet.”
