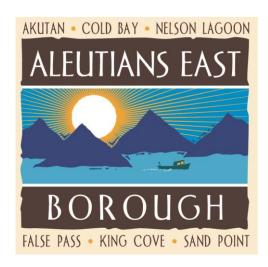

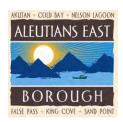

Clerk Tina Anderson reviewed the Peter Pan Seafood-Port Moller Onshore Seafood Processing Land Use Permit, 2020-01 application, in the packet. In reviewing, the Clerk said Peter Pan submitted all the required documents and permit copies for the 5-year land use permit. A 30-day public review comment period started September 2 and ended October 1, 2020. There were no public comments received.

Aleutians East Borough Assembly Minutes October 8, 2020

Warren moved to approve July and August Financial Reports and second by Carol.

Administrator Anne Bailey said July, 2020 is beginning of FY2021 saying all line items are on track as they should be for new fiscal year.

August Financial Report, AEB Raw Fish Tax, is approximately at 50% of the 5-year average. To date, \$332,820. Starting to think of alternative revenue sources and whether this is a constant trend or not. Everything else tracking as planned.

PAUL asked about alternative sources. Bailey said we are going to be discussing in the Strategic Planning cycle, and mariculture is an alternative source.

Mayor Osterback said we are careful on how we handle the funding we have available and realize we have obligations on ongoing projects and bonds. If it looks like a trend, we will have to look at all of our projects we have before us and future planning. Assembly and staff will require a financial workshop prior to any decisions. Scary to see a cut in raw fish tax and thankful the Assembly had the foresight to prepare for this.

August Investment Report:

Administrator Bailey said balance presently is \$42,294,000. Administration will move \$1.7M into AMLIP portfolio so Permanent Fund will reflect what is accurately in there.

PAUL said Permanent Fund is at a historic high adding that the further we draw down the Permanent Fund, the less interest available to share.

Emergency Ordinance 21-04, an emergency ordinance of the Assembly issuing a Declaration of Disaster Emergency in response to Covid-19:

MOTION

CAROL moved to approve Emergency Ordinance 21-04 and second by WARREN.

Administrator Bailey said declaration is in response to Covid-19. Ordinance 21-04 extends what was done previously and will remain in effect for 60 days.

Introduction Ordinance 21-05, amending the operating and capital budget for the Aleutians East Borough Fiscal Year 2021.

MOTION

Brenda moved to accept Introduction Ordinance 21-05 and set for Public Hearing at the October Special Assembly Meeting. Second by Josephine.

Administrator said on May 28 the Assembly adopted the FY21 budget. The Assembly passed a resolution for CARES Act items, which included \$50,000 allocated to AEBSD. After further consideration, administration recommends re-appropriating the CARES Act funds to AEBSD, adding \$35,000 to payroll totaling \$185,000 and \$15,000 to legal fees totaling \$90,000. Administration also recommends amending AEB FY2021 budget, by decreasing Administration salary and Assistant Administrator salary, Communications Director salary and legal line item, all to be offset by CARES Act funding; and increasing AEBSD by \$50,000 from general fund.

PAUL asked if the School District needs to itemize. Bailey said the purpose is to make their budget whole.

Resolution 21-17, authorizing the mayor to negotiate and execute a MOA between AEB, the City of False Pass and Silver Bay Seafoods for the use of the False Pass harbor Float A:

MOTION

BRENDA moved to approve Resolution 21-17 and second by DENISE.

Administrator Bailey said AEB owns the False Pass boat harbor and the city manages. Silver Bay Seafoods (SBS) has requested authorization to moor vessels 160-172 feet to Float A in order to offload fish. The harbor is not designed for vessels that length and would require modifications. AEB hired Moffett & Nichol to conduct a Condition Assessment of Float A to provide a baseline condition report of the float in the event SBS larger vessels damage the float, paid for by SBS. MOA is a 2-year term, and termination can happen without cause with 60-day notice provided; city and Borough can also terminate for cause, for instance, if Silver Bay does not pay moorage costs.

Float A shall be inspected annually to ensure that the float is not overstressed or damaged. AEB and city not responsible. Harbor is a public facility so public access must be permitted, and SBS must have proper insurance and be responsible for all damage caused to float by use or by modification to float.

WARREN asked when they are going to do the reconstruction of the float. Bailey said once MOA is approved we will work on schedule. WARREN supports them being responsible for damages

and suggested SBS find a more permanent solution, like the main dock. Mayor Osterback said the more you pump fish, the more the value goes down. This is something we did not want to do from the start. Processor didn't think about the process to get the fish. If value of fish goes down, that effects price to the fishermen. Hopefully nothing gets damaged while they figure out a permanent solution. Best we can come up with to keep the value of the fish up for processor and fishermen, at this time.

WARREN supports as a temporary solution, until SBS come up with a permanent plan.

Public Comments, from Silver Bay Seafoods, Abby Fredrick. Read by Laura Tanis.

On behalf of Silver Bay Seafoods – False Pass, we want to extend our sincere thanks to the Aleutians East Borough (AEB) for bringing forward AEB resolution #21-17 and we appreciate the opportunity to comment. We **support** this resolution, authorizing the AEB mayor to negotiate and execute a MOA between the Aleutians East Borough, the City of False Pass, and Silver Bay Seafoods for the use of the False Pass Harbor Float A, which is critical to the operations of our new processing facility in False Pass.

These temporary modifications would reduce operating costs which will ensure the long-term success of our plant, directly benefit our fishermen owners (many of which are AEB residents), and support economic stimulus offered to the community/region from having a new, state-of-the-art fish processing facility in False Pass.

The proposed temporary modifications to Float A have been designed with flexibility in mind, to transfer load from the larger vessels directly to the piles while allowing flexibility to moor smaller vessels and use the dock for other purposes by using a system that is easy to remove when the large vessels are not using the float. We would be accepting responsibility for the cost of the project and are committed to being good neighbors with those accessing this public dock.

Resolution 21-18, authorizing the Aleutians East Borough to be an applicant of an ANILCA 1110(b) Application:

MOTION

WARREN moved to approve Resolution 21-18 and second by Josephine.

Administrator Bailey said AEB and all others have been advocating to complete the construction of a 12-mile road link to connect King Cove to Cold Bay Airport. The State and other qualified applicants intend to submit an ANILCA 1110(B) application to the Federal government which would permit access to federal lands within Izembek Refuge. If approved, State, AEB or City of

King Cove would be allowed to use the federal lands inside the Refuge. Attorneys are still determining who applicant(s) should be. No additional funds from AEB will be needed.

PAUL said nothing has changed for quite a few years and asked why we waited until now to apply. Bailey said it is the appropriate time to do this and the state is taking the lead.

WARREN said the ANILCA clause was used by a northern mining community. Surrounding villages are supposed to be able to have access to the airport when surrounded by federal wilderness lands. So there is provisions in that to be able to get a right-of-way through the wilderness. When they made the Izembek wilderness, Dept of Fish & Game burned down all the King Cove residents trapping cabins and no one could claim they had rights to the lands. A lot of other community members also trapped in the area. He said King Cove Corporation doesn't have access to their lands on the west side of Cold Bay, which had been included in the land exchange. This is another way to justify getting our easement through the wilderness. He hopes to get a road from King Cove to Cold Bay.

Resolution 21-19 Requesting a Fishery Disaster Determination for the 2020 South Alaska Peninsula Commercial Salmon Fishery:

Mayor Osterback said after discussion in workshop, during break the resolution was modified.

MOTION

PAUL moved to accept the modified Resolution 21-19, which includes all AEB communities. Second by Denise.

Natural Resources Director Ernie Weiss said in September we talked about a disaster resolution for the salmon season. During workshop it was suggested we include the north and south Peninsula. So any reference to South Peninsula has been changed to Alaska Peninsula and/or Area M. Also, the 5-year average decrease percentage has been revised to 61%. He will review more thoroughly. If passed, we will submit to the State of Alaska Governor.

PAUL said when we determine the value, sometime there are spring bonuses since not available yet, asked how to calculate into formula. Weiss said the only real information we have is AEB fish tax, which is included in our resolution. Staff concludes at least 50% decrease in revenue for fishermen. There is no timeline to submit.

Mayor Osterback suggested the accompanying letter state the adjusted fish prices normally is not known until spring and that becomes part of the season earnings.

REPORTS AND UPDATES

Administrator's Report in packet. Highlights below:

COVID-19:

Eastern Aleutian Tribes reported a positive Covid case, non-Alaska resident in King Cove.

CARES Act Funding:

- Emergency Assistance and Economic Stimulus Grant: 272 applications, paid 132 residents, so far.
 Approximately \$99,000 paid out.
- Non-Profit and Civic Relief Program: Acceptance of applications started. Can be awarded up to \$10,000. Amount prorated, determined by how many applicants.
- \$100,000 appropriated for indoor air quality upgrades on AEB buildings. Working with DOWL and local Anchorage company.
- CARES Act Funding Reporting: Through August reported \$153,000 and through September expended \$103,000.

AEB Employee Policy still in place. Policy prohibits employees travelling into communities to reduce transmission of virus. We will develop travel protocol for some projects that have to happen and need to have travel occur, to be reviewed by Administrator. Covid protocol will also be customized based on community requirements.

Bi-weekly Covid Meetings: Still hosting meetings with all AEB community leaders, School District and Eastern Aleutian Tribes.

Alaska Muncipal League Conference:

Conference is virtual. Newly Elected Officials, November 9-10, annual meeting November 16-20.

Cold Bay terminal:

TSA: Final design in packet for screening area to provide the maximum public use of space and holding area. No timeline yet. AEB also installing double locking door system for TSA security requirements. It will be in secure mode 15 minutes before and after Alaska Airlines flight. Once they leave it is opened back up to the other terminal airlines.

New Ravn: Waiting to receive Ravn documentation. Ravn has been provided keys to the facility and has a trial run to Cold Bay and Dutch Harbor scheduled October 9. Flights to Sand Point tentatively scheduled to begin November 15. Ticketing system will be the same ticketing system Ravn used before.

<u>Akun Boat Harbor Study (breakwater and dock)</u>: Working with Akutan Tribal Council and Corps of Engineers. All paperwork submitted to Corps for their review and hope to get determination soon.

<u>Akutan Essential Air Service:</u> Grant and Maritime have submitted their proposals, and a letter of support for both submitted to USDOT for two-year term with a one additional three-year option. AEB would continue to pay the necessary expenses. AEB will continue to pay 50% for helicopter between Akun and Akutan, to come before the Assembly later.

<u>King Cove Access Project:</u> The Alaska Federal District Court order of opinion on the land exchange is currently under active appeal. 9th Circuit Court issued a scheduling order. King Cove Corp, tribes, State, Dept of Interior to file opening brief by October 22; opposition to King Cove Land Exchange to file by November 23; reply brief filed by December 14. Once done the 9th Circuit Court 2021 schedule will be in Anchorage in the summer. However, because of Covid some might be held virtually.

U.S. Air Force Exercises: interested in conducting a military exercise in the spring, in Cold Bay.

Assistant Administrator's Report in packet. Highlights below:

Cold Bay Clinic:

Reissued bid, due November 20 and a resolution to approve a contract will be before the Assembly in December. Bid opening will be held via video conference. Contractor to provide a Covid prevention plan and follow all federal and state mandates with a negative Covid test.

Project completion date, late July 2021, and final completion August, 2021.

Stimulus: 321 applications submitted.

Communications Director Report in packet. Highlights below:

<u>U.S. Census flyer:</u> Submitted flyers to communities for 2020 U.S. Census.

<u>In-the-Loop E-News:</u> continually going out with information.

Alaska Marine Ferry Service:

Plan to do video testimonials to post to YouTube to reach law makers and others on the importance of the ferry service in the region.

Website: Update plans in the works to improve looks and navigation.

Natural Resources Director Report in packet. Highlights below:

Alaska Marine Highway Reshaping Work Group:

Final meeting was September 29. Links in packet report. There was a discussion of the possibility eliminating the Aleutian Chain run during their reshaping discussions.

<u>BSAI Crab:</u> Bristol Bay red king crab down to 2.6M lbs. for Total Allowable Catch. Snow crab continuing to increase for past 4-5 years, 45M lbs. Going to be a West Bering Sea tanner crab, same as last year at 2.3M lbs.

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Peter Pan Seafoods will be processing crab since pollock running late after speculation they will be custom processing elsewhere. APICDA custom packing their crab in Unalaska, so loss of tax revenue.

NPFMC:

Gulf surveys are only done every other year, they need to be prioritized next year so it is not 3 years of no surveys.

Seafood Trade Relief Assistance Program:

USDA program to mitigate financial damage for any retaliatory tariffs by China on specific seafood, is available to permit holders to submit applications through CFEC until December 14. Payments based on 2019 landings.

Fishermen Zoom Meeting:

A fishermen Zoom meeting to be scheduled to review all relief programs available.

2018 Gulf of Alaska Pacific Cod Fishery Disaster Draft Distribution Plan:

Assembly commented on distribution plan twice. State came out with distribution plan adding vessel crew, increased processor allocation and community allocation. Comments due on October 19th.

Assistant Natural Resources Director Report in packet. Highlights below:

Electronic Monitoring (EM) Program:

Held outreach meeting between C and D Seasons to resolve issues and getting fleet educated. Processor engagement has been high and a lot of good response from them. Held pre-season meeting for fleet/processors. Presentation in report. Spent time putting together tools to use and educating fishermen on data collecting. EM project has been able to provide some supplemental data for stock assessments for Pollock.

Attended trawl EM Committee meeting and lots of discussion on next steps for EM across the Pacific. Trawl EM meeting report link in packet.

Data Portal:

Having difficulty finalizing a contract with Inter-Tidal Agency who is pass through of funding, to be resolved soon. Working closely with processors to get access to landings.

Mariculture:

Revisiting travel policy to allow field work in the region. Before any travel occurs will put together a thorough a Covid safety protocol, similar to processors. Also putting together a RFP for vessel charters.

Maintenance Director Report in packet. Highlights below:

AEB office paint project: Almost complete.

<u>Earthquake Damage</u>: Assessing earthquake damage in the schools.

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<u>King Cove School:</u> Hard water issues in copper piping and looking into water softener before major problems occur.

Akutan School: Aleutian Heating went out to do assessment on circulating pump heating issue.

Cold Bay terminal: Scheduling fire and sprinkler inspection.

Warren said the powerhouse pipe for waste heat to the King Cove School and clinic is in bad shape and asked who is responsible for replacement. Mobeck said he is not sure at this time and will look into it.

ASSEMBLY COMMENTS

WARREN said he heard cod has been reduced 30%, reducing the state cod season 30% also. He heard that the cod are coming up as by-catch in the trawl pollock season. He noted his concern about the state allocation that comes off of the TAC. Weiss said the state allocation comes off of the federal TAC. Last year federal TAC for cod was so low there was no federal fishery but enough for by-catch in federal fisheries and a state cod fishery. Weiss said the AP just passed a proposed TAC, final to come out in December. Feels it will be a rollover from last year, so may not be a federal season but a state season only, in the Gulf. The Bering Sea proposed spec sheet shows a decrease in P-cod.

Charlotte Levy said she does not have the by-catch numbers from Pollock trawl but will look into, if interested. WARREN said he was concerned about not having a state cod fishery. Need to make every effort to get the cod fishery going again for the fishermen.

JOSEPHINE said, in regards to the CARES Act funds, if there is a plan for left over funds, to adjust the stimulus application or a plan on the use of the left over funds. Bailey said she hopes that people continue to apply between now and November 15 deadline. Could do a second round and/or think of other ways to re-appropriate the monies.

Mayor's Update:

Mayor Osterback said regarding executive sessions, he understands there is a frustration for Assembly members to bring an Executive Session onto the agenda. If an Assembly member has something important they feel needs to be put on there, they need to contact the Administrator and possibly attorney to see if it needs to go into Executive Session. We operate on municipal rules and some things don't qualify. If there is a need from an Assembly member, that conversation should take place, and then be put on the next meeting agenda, giving staff time to prepare and bring in expert opinions, if needed.

Administrator Anne Bailey said Resolution 20-66 accepted Coronavirus Relief funds, Resolution 21-10 adopted allocation of the funds that appropriated \$50,000 to AEBSD. After further consideration, administration recommends re-appropriating the CARES Act funds allocated to the AEBSD, adding \$35,000 to payroll totaling \$185,000 and \$15,000 to legal fees totaling \$90,000.

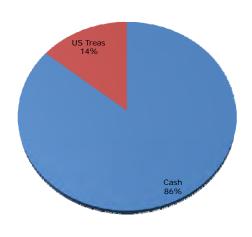

Terms & Conditions

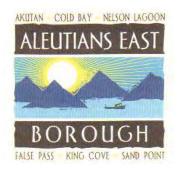

ORDINANCE 21-06

AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE OF THE ALEUTIANS EAST BOROUGH ASSEMBLY ISSUING A DECLARATION OF DISASTER EMERGENCY IN RESPONSE TO COVID-19

WHEREAS, COVID-19 is a respiratory disease that can result in serious illness or death and is caused by the SARS-Cov-2 virus ("virus"), a new strain of the coronavirus that has not been previously identified in humans and is easily transmittable person to person; and,

- **WHEREAS**, on March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization ("WHO") declared the virus a pandemic; and,
- **WHEREAS**, Alaska Governor Dunleavy issued a declaration of public health disaster emergency in response to the anticipated outbreak of COVID-19 in Alaska; and,
- **WHEREAS**, on March 13, 2020, President Donald J. Trump declared a national emergency in response to the virus pandemic; and,
- **WHEREAS**, positive cases of COVID-19 have been identified within the State of Alaska and within the Aleutians East Borough; and,
- WHEREAS, Social Distancing has been recommended, to minimize the spread of the virus; and
- **WHEREAS**, the State has put mandates in place restricting public use of state institutes, public and residential schools, libraries, archives and museums, restaurants and bars, as well as other restrictions; and
- **WHEREAS**, on March 18, 2020 Borough Administration implemented a COVID-19 Aleutians East Borough Employee Policy to help reduce transmission among staff and to help protect people who are higher risk for adverse health complications while maintaining Borough operations; and
- **WHEREAS**, on March 23, 2020 the Assembly passed Emergency Ordinance 20-07 issuing a declaration of disaster emergency in response to COVID-19; and

- **WHEREAS**, on May 14, 2020 the Assembly passed Emergency Ordinance 20-08, which superseded Emergency Ordinance 20-07; and
- **WHEREAS**, on July 9, 2020 the Assembly passed Emergency Ordinance 21-01, which superseded Emergency Ordinance 20-08; and
- **WHEREAS**, on August 13, 2020 the Assembly passed Emergency Ordinance 21-02, which superseded Emergency Ordinance 21-01; and
- **WHEREAS,** on October 8, 2020 the Assembly passed Emergency Ordinance 21-04 which superseded Emergency Ordinance 21-02; and
- **WHEREAS**, the COVID-19 pandemic may dramatically impact the Borough communities and residents and have a substantial effect on the Borough economy if unchecked; and
- **WHEREAS**, the full extent and effect of COVID-19 cannot yet be known, it remains vital for the Borough to be prepared and take all needed precautions throughout the entire timeframe of the emergency related to COVID-19; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Assembly finds that a public emergency continues to exist and deems it necessary to declare a local emergency to protect the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Borough; and

WHEREAS, Borough Code Sec. 1.20.050 (a) authorizes emergency ordinances, reading:

- (a) To meet a public emergency the assembly may adopt ordinances effective on adoption. Every emergency ordinance must contain a finding by the assembly that an emergency exists and a statement of the facts upon which the finding is based. The ordinance may be adopted, amended and adopted, or rejected at the meeting to which it is introduced. The affirmative vote of all members present, or the affirmative vote of three-fourths of the total membership, whichever is less, is required for adoption. The assembly must print and make available copies of adopted emergency ordinances.
- (b) An emergency ordinance may not be used to levy taxes to grant, renew or extend a franchise, or to regulate the rate charged by a public utility for its service.
- (c) Emergency ordinances are effective for sixty days.

WHEREAS, the Borough wishes to authorize the Mayor to request State assistance from the Governor of Alaska for costs associated with the Borough's response to the virus to meet the public safety and welfare needs arising from or incidental to COVID-19 and to recover from damage caused; and

WHEREAS, the Borough wishes to authorize the Mayor to request assistance from Federal agencies pursuant to the Stafford Act of 1988 and Other Federal Law; and

WHEREAS, a declaration of disaster emergency will alert the public to the seriousness of the risk and provide direction.

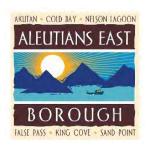
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Aleutians East Borough as follows:

- Section 1. The Assembly of the Aleutians East Borough hereby declares a local disaster emergency in response to COVID-19.
- Section 2. The Assembly of the Aleutians East Borough authorizes the Mayor to request State and Federal Assistance to meet the ongoing emergency created by COVID-19.
- Section 3. The rules requiring in-person attendance by Assembly Members under Borough Code Sec. 2.08.10(e) for regular meetings, and 2.08.020 (a) for special meetings, and all other such rules are suspended so that a quorum may be reached without gathering people at central locations.
- Section 4. Alternate means of listening in and providing public comment at Assembly Meetings, as would normally be afforded under Borough Code 2.08.010(d), shall be provided for should the teleconferencing hubs be closed.
- Section 5. All residents and visitors to the Borough and Borough Property are encouraged to maintain social distancing throughout the entire period of this emergency.
- Section 6. This Emergency Ordinance supersedes Emergency Ordinance 21-04 and shall become effective immediately upon adoption and remain in effect until January 10, 2020 pursuant to Borough Code Sec. 1.20.050(c).
- Section 7. This Emergency Ordinance may be reauthorized by telephonic quorum prior to its expiration.

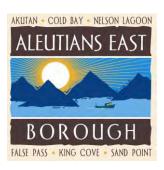

Land Use Permit Staff Recommendation Planning Commission Resolution 20-01

The Aleutians East Borough (AEB) received a land use permit application from Peter Pan Seafoods, Inc. (Peter Pan) to renew their 5-year Land Use Permit with Aleutians East Borough. This permit application requests approval for continued onshore seafood processing at Peter Pan's Port Moller Facility. Peter Pan's Port Moller Facility operates seasonally from May to September processing and freezing salmon.

Peter Pan's permit renewal was submitted to comply with the AEB's land use permit requirements for Onshore Seafood Processing Plants. Peter Pan has been in operation for over 100 years.

Peter Pan's application included a majority of the required elements. A Request for Additional Information (RFAI) was sent to Peter Pan to obtain a few additional pieces of information needed to process the permit application. Peter Pan submitted the additional information, completing Peter Pan's application.

This permit application is being processed in accordance with the AEB Municipal Code (AEBMC) requirements of Chapter 40, and must be reviewed by both the Planning Commission and Assembly, and approved by the Assembly.

This permit was subject to a 30 day public review comment period. Public review started on September 2, 2020 and ended on October 1, 2020. We have not received any comments supporting or opposing the application.

The AEB Staff Member, Tina Anderson, has reviewed the application and has prepared this Staff Recommendation for your review and consideration.

Facility Information

Peter Pan Seafoods owns and operates the Port Moller onshore seafood processing plant and is owned by two parent companies: Peter Pan Seafoods, Inc. and Maruha Nichiro Corporation.

Port Moller is located on the north side of the Alaska Peninsula, 90 miles northeast of Cold Bay. There are no communities in the immediate vicinity of the facility. The closest community is Nelson Lagoon, about 25 miles west of Port Moller.

The facility consists of an office, large processing/warehouse complex, and power house on the dock; two large shore side warehouses, and staff support facilities, fuel storage, distribution system and a water system. The facility operates seasonally (June – September), and a caretaker oversees the facility the remainder of the year. The only product currently produced at the facility is frozen salmon and salmon roe.

Property Ownership and Access

A majority of Peter Pan's onshore seafood processing plant and equipment is located on property owned by Peter Pan Seafood Inc. Peter Pan is using roads, an airstrip and a water source on AEB lands.

The AEB Port Moller airstrip and roads are also used by the Alaska Department of Fish & Game, hunting and fishing guides, and local air taxi services.

The AEB Staff recommend Peter Pan's use of the airstrip and roadway be limited to transportation use only. No fuels, chemicals or other materials may be stored at the airstrip or along the roadways, without prior permission from AEB and that no temporary or permanent structures be added. The AEB authorizes Peter Pan's forklift and shelter that are currently located at the airstrip.

Reclamation Requirements

AEB recommends the following reclamation requirements be added to permit approval.

For Peter Pan's property, Peter Pan must:

- a. Develop a reclamation closure plan for its property that includes removal of all hazardous waste, fuel, chemicals, spilled material and contaminated soils, and debris prior to closure, including a plan to retain the facilities and equipment for beneficial reuse, later use, or a plan to remove the facilities:
- b. Hire a solid waste engineer to develop a landfill closure plan that meets State of Alaska Landfill Closure Design Requirements and Best Management Practices at the time of the planned closure;

- c. Submit the plan to AEB at least 6 months prior to plant closure for review and approval;
- d. Fund and complete the reclamation; and,
- e. Ensure the reclamation is completed within 365 days of the plant closure.

For operations conducted by Peter Pan on AEB property (e.g., use of roads, airstrip, water source area), Peter Pan must:

- f. Develop a reclamation plan that includes removal of all hazardous waste, fuel, chemicals, spilled material and contaminated soils, debris, buildings and storage equipment from AEB property;
- g. Submit the plan to AEB at least 6 months prior to plant closure for review and approval;
- h. Fund and complete the reclamation; and,
- i. Ensure the reclamation is completed within 365 days of the plant closure.

These Reclamation Plan requirements will allow Peter Pan flexibility to develop Reclamation Plans that are fit-for-purpose closer to the time of closure, and will provide the AEB with the legal and fiscal assurance that a Reclamation Plan will be developed, funded, and implemented within an acceptable timeframe.

State and Federal Permits

Peter Pan operates under a host of state and federal permit requirements. Some of these permits will expire during the five year AEB permit term. Therefore, the AEB Staff recommend Peter Pan's application be approved subject to continued compliance with state and federal permit requirements, and a requirement for Peter Pan to provide AEB with a copy of all approved permit applications, certificates, and approval letters specifying the terms, conditions, or stipulations within 30 days of issue. This requirement will provide the AEB with sufficient information to ensure Peter Pan remains in compliance with its state and federal permits during the five-year AEB permit term.

Peter Pan's facility currently operates under an Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation (ADEC) Seafood Processing Facility Permit to Operate, ADEC Permit # 56-M 1251. This ADEC permit requires compliance with ADEC"s Seafood Processing and Inspection Regulations of Title 18, Alaska Administrative Code, Chapter 34 (18 AAC 34). The primary purpose of this permit is to ensure seafood is processed in a manner safe for human consumption. As part of this approval, ADEC requires Peter Pan to have a sanitation plan, meet certain facility requirements, and dispose of waste in accordance with ADEC regulations for solid waste (18 AAC 60) and wastewater (18 AAC 72).

Peter Pan's facility currently operates under the Seafood Processor's General Permit No. AK-G52-0014, which requires compliance with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit for Seafood Processors in Alaska (NPDES Permit No. AK-G52-0000). These permits address management, storage, and discharge of fish waste and wastewater into Port Moller and authorizes discharge up to 10,000,000 pounds of seafood processing waste residues per calendar year using an effluent treatment method of grinding solid seafood processing wastes to ½ inches before discharge.

Peter Pan has a projected annual amount of 5,000,000 lbs. and in 2019 discharged 1,813,864 lbs. The discharge point is approximately 300 feet from shore at a depth of 10°. Fish waste includes waste from the fillet and roe processing areas, including fish frames, fins, filet trim, discarded roe and processing and flume water. Peter Pan's permit limits discharge of fish waste and associated waste water into the port to a one acre zone of deposit offshore. A dive survey is required to make sure not more than one acre is impacted. The permit also restricts residues and waste from collecting on the shoreline, and Peter Pan must adhere to a Best Management Practice plan to control and reduce pollutant discharges. On file is a copy of Peter Pan's June 2014 Best Management Practices Plan.

Peter Pan's facility currently operates under an EPA Spill Prevention Control and Countermeasure Plan (SPCC) for the onshore portion and a USCG Facility Response Plan (FRP) for the offshore portion. Peter Pan has six diesel bulk storage tanks with a capacity of 309,600 gallons total. The double-walled diesel fuel tanks are located in a lined, diked impoundment that is sufficient to contain 110% of the capacity of the largest storage tank. It provides a secondary containment capacity in excess of 73,000 gallons, which is equal to the largest tank plus 6 inches of freeboard for precipitation. Each tank equipped with a top-mounted liquid level gauge, pressure/vacuum vent, and gauge hatch. There are two gasoline storage tanks with a capacity of 16,000 gallons total. The gasoline tanks are stored in a diked impoundment with a concrete floor and fuel resistant liner and secondary containment capacity in excess of 13,500 gallons, equal to the largest tank, plus 10 inches. Each tank equipped with a top-mounted liquid level gauge, pressure/vacuum vent, and gauge hatch. There are two day tanks. The winter watch residence emergency generator (#13) is a 550 gallon double walled tank with integral containment capacity and equipped with liquid level gauge, and overfill prevention valve and high-level alarms. Mid camp day tank (#11) is single walled 5,000 gallon tank in a concrete impound that provides a 5,700 gallons containment capacity. The power house day tank on dock (#12) has been removed from service. Bulk fuel is received from barges, transferred to the tank farm. The transfer is regulated by Coast Guard. The facility complies with the Coast Guard secondary containment requirements by maintaining an 84 gallon spill containment basin under the receiving headers. Peter Pan has containment boom, sorbents, recovery pumps and hoses, and hand and power tools on site to aid in containment and recovery of spilled products. Peter Pan does not rely on response contractors to meet federal response standards, it relies on its own equipment stored at the facility, and in the event of a major emergency, it is possible that technical assistance and support equipment be obtained from local or regional sources, or other Peter Pan facilities. The marine habitat of Port Moller is classified as a Most Environmentally Sensitive Area (MESA). The MESA determination is based on waterfowl concentrations, salmon migration, and marine mammals. In addition, the State of Alaska has established Port Moller area as a "Critical Habitat Area" to protect natural habitat. Therefore, spill prevention and rapid response is paramount and is addressed in the Facility Response Plan.

Peter Pan's facility currently operates under an ADEC solid waste permit, SWGPCAMP-23, a General Permit for the Operation of a Landfill for Remote Camps and Lodges with fewer than 50 residents. While peak residency at Peter Pan's facility in the summer is 140 people, the annual average residency is less than 50. Waste is limited to incinerated domestic solid waste (50 cubic yards of ash per year), inert waste (50 cubic yards of ash per year), and septage¹ (5,000 gallons

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¹ Septage includes liquid and solid human waste removed from a septic tank, cesspool or portable toilet.

per year). Hazardous waste, batteries, vehicle fluids, oily waste, refrigerants, and putrescible waste that has not been treated by incineration, and any other waste not specifically allowed is prohibited in the land fill.

Peter Pan's Risk Management Plan and Emergency Plans address potential hazards at the facility. Due to remote location, Peter Pan has established a fire brigade of at least 10 members, provided with training and education in the duties and functions that they are expected to perform. All members of the brigade receive training at the Washington State Fire Training Academy.

A release of anhydrous ammonia from the refrigerant system is a possible risk; the plant has one ammonia refrigeration system, mostly located in the machinery room and in the production areas of the plant; Peter Pan has an annual inspection program for this system and a contingency plan in place for responding to this type of event. A worse-case scenario would be 12,000 lbs. released and an estimated distance to toxic endpoint 1.5 miles. There are no local communities in the radius of a worse-case scenario. There is an alarm system and an evacuation plan for employees.

Peter Pan's facility currently operates under an ADEC air quality control permit Emission Limit No. AQ0019PL201 that allows burning of up to 315,000 gallons of diesel per year in its power generators. The highest amount of diesel fuel burned in any consecutive 12 months was 214,583 gallons.

The Aleutians East Borough Municipal Code (AEBMC) requires the AEB Staff to evaluate whether an applicant is using the best available air pollution control technology, alternative energy use, or ultra-low sulfur diesel fuel to reduce air pollution generated within the Borough. Peter Pan has a maintenance and repair program to ensure reliable power and to ensure the generators generate power as efficiently and clean as possible. Peter Pan uses ultra-low sulfur diesel since 2010 to reduce the amount of air pollution.

AEB Staff recommend AEB's standard stipulation for air quality control be deemed satisfied as long as Peter Pan:

- a. Remains in compliance with its ADEC air quality control permit for its existing facilities; and,
- b. Evaluates use of best available air pollution control technology, and alternative energy use, prior to replacing or adding any significant new air pollution sources.

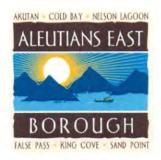
AEB Staff recommends that the Peter Pan Permit of onshore seafood processing permit be approved with the following additional stipulations:

1. Peter Pan continues to be compliant with state and federal requirements and provides AEB with a copy of all approved permit applications, certificates and approval letters specifying the terms, conditions or stipulations within 30 days of issue.

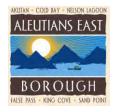

The Aleutians East Borough (AEB) permit application form and approved permit contains a list of standard permit stipulations. Additionally, the AEB has determined that the additional stipulations listed below are required to approve your permit.

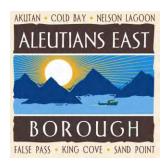
1. Reclamation Requirements:

For Peter Pan's property, Peter Pan must:

- a. Develop a reclamation closure plan for its property that includes removal of all hazardous waste, fuel, chemicals, spilled material and contaminated soils, and debris prior to closure, including a plan to retain the facilities and equipment for beneficial reuse, later use, or a plan to remove the facilities;
- b. Hire a solid waste engineer to develop a landfill closure plan that meets State of Alaska Landfill Closure Design Requirements and Best Management Practices at the time of the planned closure;
- c. Submit the plan to AEB at least 6 months prior to plant closure for review and approval;
- d. Fund and complete the reclamation; and,
- e. Ensure the reclamation is completed within 365 days of the plant closure.

For operations conducted by Peter Pan on AEB property (e.g., use of roads, airstrip, water source, buildings and storage), Peter Pan must:

- 2. Develop a reclamation plan that includes removal of all hazardous waste, fuel, chemicals, spilled material and contaminated soils, debris, buildings and storage equipment from AEB property;
- 3. Submit the plan to AEB at least 6 months prior to plant closure for review and approval;
- **4.** Fund and complete the reclamation; and,
- **5.** Ensure the reclamation is completed within 365 days of the plant closure.
- **6.** Additional Air Pollution Control Requirements: Due to the age of the power generators used, use of ultralow sulfur diesel to reduce emissions, and implementation of a maintenance and repair program to optimize combustion efficiency and reduce overall fuel use and emissions, the AEB's standard stipulation for air quality control is satisfied as long as Peter Pan:
 - a. Remains in compliance with its ADEC air quality control permit for its existing facilities; and,
 - b. Evaluates use of best available air pollution control technology, and alternative energy use, prior to replacing or adding any significant new air pollution sources.
- 7. <u>Property Ownership Resolution:</u> Property ownership issues must be resolved within one (1) year from permit authorization. An extension may be issued if extenuating circumstances occur.

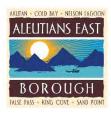

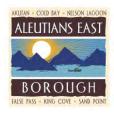

COVID-19

The Borough continues to be engaged in COVID-19 issues. Below are a few updates regarding COVID-19:

• CARES Act Funding:

- O The Aleutians East Borough Emergency Assistance & Economic Stimulus Grant was released on September 1, 2020. As of November 6, 2020, the Borough has received 475 applications for stimulus funds and we have distributed approximately \$269,000 in stimulus funds to 170 from Sand Point, 150 from King Cove, 14 from Nelson Lagoon, 8 from Cold Bay, 7 from False Pass and 5 from Akutan). To date, we have sent out denial letters to 6 individuals who did not meet the application criteria. Applications are due November 15th.
- The Borough received 10 Non-Profit and Civic Relief Program applications. Applications by the October 30, 2020 deadline. We have paid \$10,000 to nine of the organizations and are waiting on additional information from one entity.
- o Indoor Air Quality Upgrades: The Borough has entered into contract agreements with Superior Mechanical in the amount of \$79,362 to install air purification systems in the King Cove and Sand Point Schools. Superior is tentatively scheduled to go to the communities during the first week of December. They will be required to follow COVID-19 protocols prior to and during travel.
- O Cold Bay Community Center Conversion: On October 20, 2020, the Borough entered into a grant agreement with the City of Cold Bay for the conversion of the community center. Per the agreement, the work will be done prior to December 30, 2020.
- o EAT Funding: A grant agreement has been sent to EAT for their review and signature for them to purchase supplies in relation to COVID-19.
- CARES Act Funding Reporting: Administration is still in the process of compiling the October CARES Act expenditures but based off the current information the Borough has expended approximately \$650,000 in CARES Act Funds.
- The Borough continues to post COVID-19 related items on the Borough's Website and on the Borough's Facebook Page.
- The Borough continues to host bi-weekly meetings with the Borough community leaders, Eastern Aleutian Tribes, and our school district to touch base on what is

- occurring during this unprecedented time.
- The Borough is also attending Alaska Municipal League Meetings, State of Alaska Emergency Manager's briefings, ECHO's, Alaska Municipal Managers Association Meetings, Fishery discussions and others.

Cold Bay Terminal

- TSA Security Requirements: The Borough has attended numerous meetings with Alaska Airlines and the State to determine security access to the terminal. New cores and locks have been ordered and a key audit system will be initiated to meet TSA requirements. We have also purchased signage and other items to meet TSA needs.
- Ravn Cold Bay Terminal and Service Update: Ravn has received the keys to the facility. They are still waiting for the DOT to approve them to fly scheduled service. They are currently flying charters and will be offering public sale on charters hopefully next week for Sand Point.

King Cove Road Update

- 9th Circuit Appeal: The King Cove Group has appealed the District Court Decision. The State of Alaska has also appealed this case and is working closely with us on this appeal. The Opening Brief is due on November 23, 2020. The opponents will file their Answering Brief in December and we will file a Reply Brief in January. Following that, the Court will schedule an oral argument later in 2021, most likely in the late spring or summer.
- Section 1110(b) Application: The King Cove Group is working with the State of Alaska on an application for Section 1110(b) of ANILCA which would provide access to King Cove to Cold Bay. The 1110(b) application has been filed by the State on behalf of the City of King Cove and the Aleutians East Borough. Work on that application will continue.

Other Items

- Strategic Planning: We continue to meet with PGS to discuss the upcoming planning cycle. We will be having the Strategic Planning Meeting on December 10, 2020 from 12:00 to 3:00 p.m.
- Alaska Municipal League Virtual Conference: AML will be hosting their Annual Local Government Conference Fires, Foundations, Futures virtually this year. The Newly Elected Officials Training will be held November 9-10, 2020 and the 70th Annual Local Government Conference will be held November 16-20, 2020. If you are interested in attending, please let Tina or I know.
- I have continuously attended AML, State of Alaska Emergency Operations Meetings, ECHO's and many other meetings throughout the month.
- I have also been continuously been conducting other day to day operations.

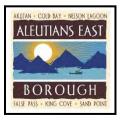
Other Items & Announcements

Strategic Plan:

I've been working on the marine highway narrative section of the Government & Policy section of the strategic plan. To start with, I created a YouTube Channel for the Borough. What we hope to do is include testimonials from



community leaders in our Borough regarding the ferry and what the impacts have been from reductions in service. I'm currently looking into how we can create these videos remotely, whether it's on Zoom or on Microsoft Teams. Ultimately, the idea is to upload these videos to YouTube and send the links to lawmakers so they have this information before making any decisions during the next legislative session.

Another part of this is a petition for Change.org that we have drafted regarding the importance of the Alaska Marine Highway System to rural coastal Alaska communities. We plan to circulate this online. The goal is to have as many people sign it as possible. This will be another vehicle that we hope to use, to help lawmakers understand our position.

An additional section of the plan includes looking at how we can update our website design as well as make it easier to navigate. I recently obtained Tina's input. I'm hoping we can get more feedback from staff about this improvement.

PCE White Paper:

I'm currently working on research to draft our Power Cost Equalization white paper. As most people know, the PCE reduces the high cost of electricity in rural Alaska for many residential and community facility customers. The program serves about 84,000 Alaskans in 194 communities. However, at one point in 2019, the governor had proposed reducing funding to the PCE. Fortunately, so far, full funding to the PCE remains intact. This paper will include a history of this program as well as what has occurred in recent years.

In the Loop:

The last In the Loop newsletter included a story about two hikers from the lower 48 who completed an impressive 2500-mile-long hike, ending their journey near Cape Sarichef on Unimak Island. Also in the newsletter was a reminder about the November 15th deadline for the Borough's Emergency Assistance and Economic Stimulus Grant Program. The application is on the AEB website. In addition, there's a notice that the City of False Pass is applying for financial assistance under the Rural Development Community Facilities Direct Loan and Grant Program to construct the harbor house.

(Draft) Save the Alaska Marine Highway System!

Steep cuts imposed on Alaska's ferry system during the past few years have been devastating to the rural communities that count on this service. The Alaska Marine Highway System brings in passengers, food, medicine, vehicles and other essential goods. In addition, the ferries serve as an important link, allowing school sports teams to visit other communities and participate in regional competitions. Students in smaller towns are also able to travel to the larger communities that have swimming pools, so they can learn how to swim. This is an essential skill for communities that make their living out on the water. Without the ferry system, this type of interaction is cost-prohibitive.

Under Governor Mike Dunleavy, there has been a 30% reduction in the Marine Highway System's operating budget. That reduction isn't just an inconvenience. It translates into limited service for coastal Alaska. The M/V Tustumena, for example, provides only four trips per year to the communities it serves (Homer, Kodiak and the Aleutian Chain), down from 12 runs just a few years ago.

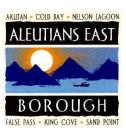
The Alaska Marine Highway system covers nearly 3,500 miles of coastline, serving 33 communities from islands in Southeast Alaska to the Aleutian Chain. It may be difficult to understand how important the ferry system is for those who have other options. In urban areas, if a road is full of potholes or a dilapidated bridge has to be closed, there is usually another way around. That's not the case for numerous towns served by the Alaska Marine Highway System. In many parts of rural Alaska, there are *no* roads or bridges connecting communities. The Alaska ferry system *IS* our highway, and it provides a vital transportation link for residents, local governments, commercial fishermen and other businesses throughout coastal Alaska.

It's so important that we make our voices heard! Governor Dunleavy and our lawmakers need to understand how critical the Alaska Marine Highway is to the communities that rely upon it. Keeping the funding intact for Alaska's ferry system is essential. Further cuts are simply unacceptable. Please sign the petition and save our ferry system!

North Pacific Fishery Management Council

The NPFMC will set final GOA & BSAI groundfish specifications (agenda items C3 & C2) at the December meeting. There is very little new information to consider this year as most North Pacific surveys were cancelled this year due to COVID. The Groundfish Plan Team will meet November 16-20 in advance of the SSC, AP and Council meetings.

In December the Council will take up in earnest BSAI Pcod rationalization, for pot gear catcher processors, initial review, and the main <u>December agenda</u> item, C5 BSAI Pcod Trawl Catcher Vessel LAPP Initial Review. Several C5 elements and options of interest to the AEB: GOA sideboards, processor shares, limits to offshore deliveries and cooperative structures.

The Council is mandated by the court to take final action in December on the C4 agenda item, Salmon FMP for Cook Inlet. This action sets the stage for a future action that will dictate management change for the other salmon traditional net fishing areas in the EEZ: in South Peninsula waters between Unimak and Sanak islands, and in the Prince William Sound.

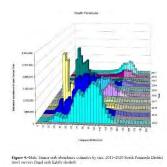
The Council has a call for nominations to the AP and SSC, due November 27th. There are seven 3-yr seats available on the AP, with six members likely to be reappointed. My term on the AP expires after the December meeting, having served the maximum three consecutive terms. Seats are not designated to a particular fishery or area, but we are hopeful the Council will consider a new AP member to fill my seat representing a WGOA community perspective.

Alaska Marine Highway Reshaping Work Group

The workgroup established by the Governor to make recommendations on the State ferry system, based on the Northern Economics/DOT report, submitted their work group report to the Governor last month, made public October 22nd. Recommendations regarding Southwest Alaska include reducing service to SW AK to 2 trips a year (page 19). The report does not make specific recommendations for the Tustumena replacement vessel, but in general is not supportive. Work Group member Rep. Louise Stutes pushed back in her comments attached to the report, page 30.

If the Governor establishes a new governing board for the AMHS, the Marine Transportation Advisory Board (MTAB) is expected to submit input to that board. I am currently a member of the MTAB.

The 2021 South Peninsula Tanner crab season will be closed again for the 8th year in a row. Chignik will be closed for the 9th consecutive season and Kodiak will also be closed after enjoying three open seasons.

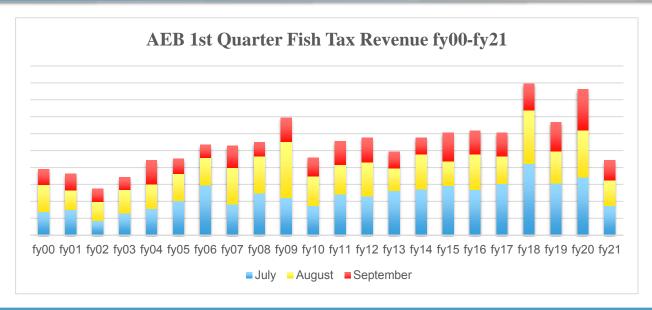

Electronic Monitoring - WGOA2/EFP:

- I submitted the Annual Financial Report and the budget is tracking as expected. The only major deviation in 2020 was the shoreside observer line item, which was offset by CARES funding.
- Pollock has finally closed in the GOA for 2020; after vessels fished 620 they were able to put together a CS agreement to cleanup TAC in 610. We are reviewing the final trips logged in D season, and I have included informal assessments for <u>C Season</u> and <u>D Season</u> from Saltwater.
- Key highlights:
 - Major improvements in shoreside observer data collection in GOA; using scrubbed logbook data to supplement pollock stock assessment
 - Still seeing issues in correctly filling out/sending in logbooks; plants inputting data into eLandings correctly/at all. eLog implementation in 2021 may alleviate some of the current issues with paper logbooks. We've discussed creating a webinar training to help with ongoing education.
 - Council support for extension of the EFP through 2022 and recommended changes to the EFP; regulated program anticipated for 2023.

NGA Fishermen's Data Portal:

- We have finally agreed upon the Saltwater and Chordata contracts with Intertidal Agency, specifically language regarding the IP clause.
- I have received direct access to eLandings from one plant and am working on the remaining plants; we plan to pilot the portal in 610 A season (if there is a season), or for fishermen who participate in 620.

AFSC Cod Tagging Project:

- We have resumed preparations for the cod tagging study to take place March 2021; AFSC is expected to approve funds for this project. I have reviewed the draft proposal, and our team has met recently to discuss the sampling design, preliminary COVID protocols and logistics.
- AFSC requires at-sea safety training to assist in field research; I am reaching out to the observer program to fulfill this requirement.

Mariculture:

- I have resumed preparations for field work. I have completed a draft Risk Management Plan, as well as supplies list, sampling design, etc. I am currently awaiting approval for the NFWF budget amendment. Given the increase in cases and recent lockdown in Akutan, travel may be postponed.
- The <u>DNR Aquatic Farm Lease</u> has been reviewed and approved as to form by AEB Attorney. I am working with our insurance broker to secure the Corporate Surety bond and Certificate of Insurance. Submission of these requirements and the signed lease will finalize the lease.

Other:

- The NRD has participated in the ongoing strategic planning sessions.
- I am still working on a review of the current available literature on hatchery salmon impacts on wild populations as time allows.

Re: Washington Update

- 1. False Pass Harbor Claim: The House of Representatives has passed a version of the Water Resources Development Act reauthorization ("WRDA"). The Senate WRDA bill has been reported from the Environment & Public Works Committee. The Senate version of the bill has the bill language which would waive the Borough's cost share for the civil damages the Army Corps was assessed by the Army Board of Contract Appeals to Kelly Ryan for the False Pass Harbor project (roughly \$4 million). The bill language is generic in nature, and hinges on a finding that the Army Corps contracting officer acted in a negligent fashion. Apparently the Seminole Indian Tribe has a similar scenario and entered into the discussions on the House side as the bill was moving through the House. This complicated the discussions in the House and the House bill does not contain a provision to waive the False Pass claim. The House and Senate staffers are working to try to reconcile the different versions of WRDA in an effort to try and pass a final bill after the elections. Both Representative Young and Senator Sullivan are continuing to make the False Pass claim waiver a high priority for this year's WRDA bill.
- 2. False Pass Energy: In September, the Senate Energy & Natural Resources Committee held a hearing on the potential for new offshore energy technologies, including marine kinetic energy. Mr. Stuart Davies, CEO of Ocean Renewable Power Company, Inc. testified and briefly discussed the company's ocean energy project in False Pass. The references can be found on page 3 of his written testimony below.

- **3. Essential Air Service:** The Essential Air Service ("EAS") branch of US DOT has circulated a Request for Proposal for the Unalaska EAS designation which may have an impact of the current Alaska Airlines Service through Cold Bay.
- U.S. DOT received two offers in response to its Request for Proposal for the Unalaska EAS designation. The new Ravn Air Service has offered to provide air service at the EAS minimum levels or better for no subsidy payments. The minimum levels to Unalaska are six flights per week during peak and five flights per week during off-peak. This would involve direct service between Anchorage and Unalaska. The second offer proposes using Kodiak as a hub in providing service to Unalaska. The EAS Program does not currently recognize Kodiak as a hub for the Unalaska service. The combination of subsidy-free service and direct service from Anchorage makes Ravn the leading candidate for the Essential Air Service designation. Ravn has been waiting on approvals from both the FAA (the adequacy of safety protocols and

pilot fitness) and US DOT (financial fitness review). We do not expect the EAS Branch to make any decision on the EAS designation until the FAA and US DOT finish their reviews.

Alaska Airlines did not submit a proposal in response to the Unalaska EAS RFP. Nothing would preclude Alaska Airlines from continuing its hub service through Cold Bay. This may change if Alaska Air agrees to include Ravn in its code share and rewards program.

4. FY 2021 Appropriations: The House passed 10 of the 12 appropriations bills over the summer, while the Senate failed to pass any of its bills. As a result, Congress has passed a short-term Continuing Resolution to keep Federal agencies and programs operating at existing funding levels through Dec. 11. Congress is planning a post-election lame duck session to begin in mid-November to consider the appropriations bills and other remaining legislation to close out the 116th Congress. We are likely to see an Omnibus Appropriations Bill or series of "Minibuses" voted on by the end of 2020 or in the early part of 2021.

The Senate is in pro-forma session this week while Judiciary Committee hearings are underway to consider the nomination of Amy Barrett to the Supreme Court. The full Senate will reconvene the week of October 19th to vote on her nomination. The House has adjourned until after the election but the Speaker has told Members to be ready to return to Washington should vital legislation require a vote. All these plans are tentative and subject to change.

5. Further CV-19 Legislative Relief – State, Local, Territorial & Tribal Government (SALT) Assistance: Negotiations continue on the next round of CV legislative relief. Negotiations on behalf of the Trump Administration have been led by Dept of Treasury Secretary Mnuchin, with Speaker Pelosi leading them on behalf of Congressional Democrats. Senate Majority Leader McConnell has been more in the background during these discussions as there are splits among Senate Republicans on the need for and amount of relief. The prospects for agreement on a final package are difficult to forecast as of the date of this report. If a final deal is reached, we will send an additional report with the details.

The Administration had issued a counterofferof \$1.8 trillion to the House Democratic proposal of \$2.2 billion (see below analysis of the "revised" HEORES Act). Secretary Mnuchin has indicated a willingness to accept additional SALT relief in the amount of \$300 billion, a lesser amount than in the "revised" HEROES Act (\$436 billion). There is general bi-partisan agreement on issues such as further relief to schools; extension of the Payroll Protection Program; further individual stimulus checks; and additional airline industry relief. The main issues of outstanding disagreement, in addition to overall bill cost and the amount of SALT assistance, include the levels of unemployment funding; liability protections for employers; CV-19 testing, PPE, contract tracing funding and planning; and childcare funding and tax credits.

At the beginning of the month, the House passed on a largely party-line vote, a "revised" or "updated" HEROES Act that drops the cost of the earlier-passed HEROES Act from \$3.4 trillion to \$2.2 trillion. The "revised" HEROES Act includes \$436 billion in SALT relief. By way of comparison, the earlier version provided \$915 billion while the CARES Act included \$150 billion. The new bill provides separate funding streams to States, counties/boroughs, municipalities, territories, tribes, and multistate transportation entities. The House formula for

distribution in the funding streams is population-based and will generally favor more populous States, counties and municipalities.

- States \$238 billion. Each State would receive an amount based on the ratio of the State's unemployed to the national number of unemployed, with each State receiving a minimum floor payment of \$500 million. By way of comparison, the CARES Act provided minimum State payments of \$1.25 billion, the amount that the State of Alaska received.
- Counties (includes Boroughs) \$89.5 billion, with each county's award based on its population relative to all counties nationally. The distribution would come directly from the Treasury Department to the counties/boroughs.
- **Municipalities** \$89.5 billion, of which \$26.85 billion would go to municipalities of populations less than 50,000. For the <50,000 municipalities funds, the allocation each State receives is based on the ratio of the population of all its <50,000 municipalities versus the population of all same-sized municipalities nationally. Once a State allocation is made it is further divided for award to each <50,000 municipality in the State as a proportion of its population relative to all <50,000 municipalities in that State. A State must make the distributions within 30 days. Failure to distribute funds by a State in that period results in the responsibility reverting to the Treasury.
- **Tribes** \$9.5 billion. Alaska Native/Village Corporations are prohibited from receiving any relief.
- **Territories** \$9.5 billion.
- **Multistate transportation entities** -- \$100 million.

The "revised" HEROES Act includes language extending the deadline on use of SALT funds from the CARES Act to Dec. 31, 2021 and provides greater flexibility in the use of those funds to make up for foregone revenue as a result of the pandemic. Further, the bill provides broad flexibility in the use of the new funding to replace foregone revenue with no deadline on when those funds must be spent.

6. CARES Act – SALT Stabilization Payment Guidance/FAQs: The Treasury Department continues to update its guidance on permissible uses of SALT stabilization payments. The most recent update was September 2nd with link below as well as to the accompanying FAQs. The recent additions are more favorable to SALT use of CARES Act stabilization funds. The most important determination is that a SALT can use the funds for full payroll and benefits costs (including hazard and overtime pay but not bonuses) of public health and safety personnel from March 1 to December 30 if those personnel have been "substantially dedicated" to responding to and mitigating the CV pandemic, with the presumption that all SALT health and safety personnel meet that standard unless the SALT's chief executive determines otherwise. Furthermore, the guidance and FAQs allow for the designation of time/expense by other SALT personnel on CV-19-related work provided it is properly

documented. There remains, however, a statutory requirement that stabilization payments must be spent by the end of the calendar year.

- **7. 2020 Federal Election**: The following reflects a summation of what many non-partisan analysts are assessing as possible outcomes for the Presidential, Senate and House elections in November. They reflect trends present at this time and are subject to change (and most likely will) as we get closer to November 3rd.
 - Presidential: Aggregate averaging of the major national polls over the latter half of the summer had former Vice President Biden up by 6 to 7 points over President Trump, but that gap has widened in the last 2-3 weeks and is at 10-11 points at the start of this week. His average polling lead nationally is about 4 points above the advantage Hillary Clinton had during the same time period in 2016. Biden holds a lead in a number swing states (Arizona, North Carolina, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania. Michigan and Iowa) that the President won in 2016. The average polling differential in several of those states is within the statistical margin of error of 5 points while others (Michigan, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin) are in the 5 to 10 point range. The key bellwether states of Florida and Ohio are polling so tightly that they are too close to make a forecast. The bases of both parties will be highly motivated but turnout may also be affected by pandemic fears and closing or consolidation of many polling places. Those constraints, however, will be mitigated in many states by the greater availability of early or mail in voting than in 2016.
 - Senate: The Republicans currently control the Senate 53-47, with 23 Republican and 12 Democratic-held seats up for election. For the Democrats to gain control of the Senate, they must have a net gain of 4 seats, or 3 seats and the Presidency (the Vice President acting as tiebreaker). There are 10 closely contested seats held by Republicans and 2 held by Democrats. It is expected that Republicans will lose seats in Arizona and Colorado. Democrats currently have the polling edge in Maine, North Carolina and Iowa as well. Republicans are expected to gain a seat in Alabama and challenge in the Michigan race. They hold slight edges for incumbent seats in Georgia (two races) and South Carolina but those races are now tightening. The other Democratic and Republican seats facing election are not expected to change hands.
 - House: The Democrats currently control the House by 232 to 198. There is 1 Libertarian (former and retiring Republican Rep. Justin Amash from Michigan) and 4 vacancies (3 Republican seats and 1 Democratic seat) due to recent resignations or death. There are 11 seats currently held by Democrats that are considered "toss ups" by the non-partisan Cook Political Report. These include multiple freshmen that captured seats in the 2018 mid-term elections that put the Democrats in control of the chamber, with a

number of these districts voting in favor of President Trump in 2016. Eight of these districts supported him with a 10 percentage point or greater advantage. There are 4 Republican-held seats that are favored to flip to the Democrats (this includes two recently redrawn seats in North Carolina due to court-ordered redistricting that are now very blue districts and persuaded the Republican incumbents to retire), while there are 14 Republican-held seats that are considered "toss ups." Almost all non-partisan election analysts forecast that the House will remain under Democratic control, with the vast majority of Democratic- and Republican-held seats considered safe for the incumbent party. As a result, the net shift in seats from one party to the other in either direction is likely to be less than a dozen seats, with the probabilities showing the Democrats more likely to secure a slight net gain.

- **8. Earmarks**: The House Select Committee on Modernization of Congress has issued its final bipartisan recommendations on ways to improve the functions and operations of Congress. Included in its recommendations is the return to the practice of Congressionally-directed spending, otherwise known as earmarking. Earmarking has been prohibited since 2011, although in the last few years there has been increased discussion within both parties about resuming the practice. The recommendation will be considered as part of a package of House procedural and other rule changes considered by the House Rules Committee to go into effect for the 117th Congress. Under the recommendation, Congressionally-directed spending will be restricted to SALT governments and non-profits. If the recommendation is adopted, it might apply to the FY 2022 appropriations bills, surface transportation/public infrastructure legislation, and other project-related bills. Both the House Majority Leader and Whip, the number 2 and 3 positions in the House Democratic Leadership, have endorsed resumption of the practice.
- **9. Infrastructure Investment:** There have been no significant developments on this issue since our last report. There is bi-partisan support on this issue, with some legislative progress (bills passing the House and through Senate committee) in the 116th Congress that will hopefully carry over in the next Congress.
- **10. Payroll Protection Program (PPP):** The deadline for applying for a PPP loan closed August 8 but Congress is considering providing additional funding and extending that time period as part of the next CV-19 relief package as well as allowing for a second loan under certain conditions. Separately, the Treasury Department and SBA have given the go-ahead for lender approval of PPP loan forgiveness applications. This includes a simplified forgiveness application for those who received less than \$50,000. - **11. Port Investment Toolkit**: The Maritime Administration has released a port investment toolkit to give guidance to those communities seeking Federal funding for maritime/port infrastructure projects through a number of Dept. of Transportation grant programs. 12. CARES Act – Economic Development Administration Assistance: The EDA has issued a notice of funding availability for economic development projects funded by the CARES Act. The range of individual funding for a project is \$100,000 to \$30 million with EDA anticipating making 3,000 awards with a Federal cost share from 80 to 100 percent. 13. Fisheries & Oceans

- **CV-19 & Fisheries Management:** Every aspect of fisheries management has been impacted by the mitigation measures and shelter-in-place restrictions imposed by Federal, State, and Local authorities in response to the pandemic. Actions taken include
 - o The Regional Fishery Management Councils have shifted from in-person meetings to meetings held electronically through telecommunication media.
 - O NOAA Fisheries has cancelled 55 fishery surveys around the Nation. NOAA has indicated that these surveys account for approximately 1,380 lost planned days-at-sea between March 20 and July 20, 2020. NOAA is shifting its focus to its unmanned wind and solar powered surface vessels and underwater ocean gliders to collect fishery and ocean condition data. The unmanned surface vessels will be deployed in the Bering Sea to conduct an emergency survey of the walleye pollock resource. Four unmanned surface vessels will also be deployed in the Arctic to continue the planned mapping of the Arctic North Slope.
 - o NOAA issued an emergency order providing its Regional Administrators with the authority to wave fishery observer requirements on a case-by-case basis. These waivers will be granted if there are travel restrictions in place which impede the placement of observers, or when there are insufficient qualified observers available due to health, safety, or training issues related to CV-19.
 - O Senator Murkowski has sent a bipartisan letter with 18 other Senators (including Senator Sullivan) to NOAA raising concern about the prospects for future fisheries surveys. The letter urges NOAA to emulate steps taken by the Navy and Coast Guard to conduct successful research cruises during the pandemic. It requests that NOAA develop a written plan for next year's surveys to be submitted by December 15.
- CARES Act -- Fisheries Disaster Relief: Twelve States have submitted their CV-fisheries disaster relief spend plans and gotten NMFS approval. The State of Alaska has just released its expenditure plan for the \$50 million share it received from the total \$300 million that was provided in the Act. Public comments are due by Oct 19. Once it is finalized and approved by NOAA, the Pacific States Marine Fisheries Commission will handle the processing of applications and awarding of funds to eligible individuals/businesses. Applicants must sign a sworn attestation that their revenue losses exceed 35 percent when compared to the average annual year from 2015 to 2019. The

sum of the amount they apply for plus any funds they receive from other CV-19 Federal relief (such as the Payroll Protection Act) and revenues derived from 2020 fishing cannot exceed their annual average revenues from the prior five years. • **USDA Seafood Trade Relief**: The USDA has announced the award of \$530 million to go to certain fisheries that have been negatively impacted by unfair trade and tariff practices by China and the European Union. Eligible commercial fishermen (processors are not eligible under this program) include those that participated in the following fisheries – salmon, cod, pollock, crab (Dungeness, king, snow and southern tanner), sablefish, and Atka mackerel. Total payments per recipient are capped at \$250,000 with application deadline of December 14th. Details on the program are below.

- Magnuson-Stevens Act (MSA): The last time Congress updated the law was in 2006. We are due for reauthorization but this is an issue that will be pushed into the 117th Congress. Only one bill (H.R. 3697, from Rep. Young) was introduced in the 116th Congress that would amend the MSA in a comprehensive manner. There are approximately 32 other House bills that would amend the MSA to a far lesser degree. House Water Oceans & Wildlife Subcommittee Chairman Jared Huffman (D-CA) has conducted multiple MSA listening sessions around the country. He did not hold one in Alaska but has stated he will do so. The Senate held no MSA hearings and no Senate "discussion drafts" or actual reform bills were offered in the 116th Congress. We think MSA legislative activity will pick up in both bodies in the next Congress.
- Pink Salmon Migration Study: The Alaska Fisheries Science Center has issued a
 report indicating climatic shifts in pink salmon migratory patterns northward,
 highlighting the future opportunities for this fishery in the Norton Sound -https://www.fisheries.noaa.gov/feature-story/pink-salmon-may-benefit-pacific-arctic-warms

- National Commercial Fishing Safety Advisory Committee Openings: The Coast
 Guard is seeking applicants to fill 18 openings (some will likely be reappointments) on its
 outside advisory committee on commercial fishing safety. Ten members must come from
 the commercial fishing industry. Applications are due Dec. 14, with details at the link -https://www.federalregister.gov/documents/2020/10/13/2020-22571/national-commercial-fishing-safety-advisory-committee-vacancy
- Marine Mammal Interactions in Fisheries: NMFS has published its annual list for public comment that categorize U.S. fisheries into three tiers based on the observed level of past marine mammal interactions. It also includes additions of certain marine mammals that those fisheries must account for and report on. Changes include -- the BSAI Pacific Cod pot fishery has been elevated from Category III to Category II due to a 2017 entanglement of a humpback whale. The Aleutian Island stock of harbor seals has been added to the list for the Category II BSAI Rockfish trawl fishery based on a 2014 observed mortality and to the Category III Alaska BSAI Atka Mackerel trawl fishery due to an observed mortality in 2016. Cook Inlet harbor seals were added to the Category III Gulf of Alaska halibut longline fishery. A number of species were removed from different North Pacific fisheries as well. Separately, NMFS has issued the list of foreign fisheries and nations with significant marine mammal interactions, with links to both lists below.

- **Aquaculture**: In August, the U.S. 5th District Court of Appeals upheld a 2018 lower court ruling that NOAA lacks the legal authority to permit aquaculture activities in the EEZ. This ruling is expected to directly impact the first major net pen operation currently in the permit approval stage to raise Almaco jacks off the coast of Central Florida in the Gulf of Mexico. The ruling is also expected to put added pressure on Congress to pass national aquaculture legislation to authorize the permitting of offshore aquaculture operations in the EEZ. In September, Senator Wicker, Chairman of the Senate Commerce, Science, and Transportation Committee, reintroduced the AQUAA Act (S. 4723) to establish a management and permitting framework for offshore aquaculture facilities. Earlier in the year, Rep. Collin Peterson (D-MN) introduced the counterpart House bill (HR 6191). The bills provide the authorization to allow aquaculture in the EEZ off the coastlines of States that otherwise restrict or prohibit aquaculture in their own waters, such as is the case with Alaska's finfish aquaculture. This federalism issue has been a major sticking point in the movement of the AQUAA Act previously, along with concerns over the socio-economic, biological, and management impacts on wildcaught species. We anticipate a more serious effort to move legislation in the 117th Congress.
- Mariculture Permitting: The Army Corps has issued a proposed rule for public comment to establish a new nationwide permit (NWP) that authorizes structures anchored

to the seabed in Federal waters over the outer continental shelf for seaweed mariculture activities. The Corps is also proposing to include multi-trophic mariculture activities, if the mariculture operator wants to cultivate other species such as bivalve shellfish with the seaweed. The rule vests much of the permitting authority with the Corps district engineers. - **Revised HEROES Act Fisheries Disaster Relief**: The bill includes an additional \$250 million in additional CV-19 related fisheries disaster relief. \$25 million of the amount is set aside for tribal fisheries. The bill language otherwise does not alter the criteria set in the CARES Act. The earlier HEROES Act provided \$100 million while the two Senate CV-19 relief bills from earlier in the summer each included \$500 million.
- Save Our Seas Act: This bill, sponsored by Reps. Young and Bonamici (D-OR) in the House and Senators Sullivan and Whitehouse (D-RI) in the Senate, has now passed the House. If it clears the Senate it will go directly to the President and he is expected to sign it. Among other measures, the legislation establishes or requires -- a Marine Debris Response Trust Fund to combat marine debris events; a prize for innovation in capturing or preventing plastic waste; a strategy by EPA to reduce plastic from entering the waste stream and improve recycling; and engagement by the U.S. in negotiating further international agreements to reduce marine debris.
- World Trade Organization (WTO) Negotiation On Fishing Subsidies: WTO negotiations for a text eliminating harmful subsidies continued in September. The WTO's goal is to secure an agreement by the end 2020 to curb illegal, unreported and unregulated fishing and prohibit certain forms of fisheries subsidies that lead to overcapacity and overfishing, with differential treatment for developing countries. The WTO did not release the draft text. At the last meeting there was discussion on delaying a final agreement until next year due to the impacts on the pandemic.
- Implementation of Seafood Promotion Executive Order: At the annual national meeting of the Regional Fishery Management Councils, senior NMFS officials discussed implementation of the President's E.O. -- Promoting American Seafood Competitiveness and Economic Growth. Among the items being considered include re-establishing the National Seafood Council with possibly a 17 member board and upwards of a \$25 million annual budget to promote U.S. seafood exports and competitiveness.
- Digital Coast Act: Legislation sponsored by Senators Baldwin (D-WI) and Murkowski
 – S. 1069, the Digital Coast Act to improve the digitization of U.S. coastal mapping has
 now passed the Senate. The bill seeks greater use and deployment of advanced remote
 sensing and geospatial imaging by NOAA, in partnership with other Federal agencies,
 State and local governments and the private sector, with the goals of better mapping of
 coastal infrastructure, elevation, land use/cover, living resources and habitat, and human
 uses.

• **DESCENDS Act**: The House has passed legislation that requires recreational and commercial fishermen in the Gulf of Mexico to use a venting or descending devise to reduce barotrauma to released deep water reef species and improve survival rates. The legislation does not extend to other regions, leaving it to the discretion of the regional fishery management councils on whether use of this equipment is appropriate for their fisheries.
